This post explains the meanings of “check out (of)”, “check in (to)”, and “check off.” “Check out (of)” can mean to officially notify someone that you are leaving, “conferir”, or it can mean to follow procedures for borrowing something, usually from a library. “Check in (to)” can mean “investigate” or officially notify someone that you have arrived.” “Check off” means to make a mark to indicate that something on a list has been completed.
